

#### MESSAGE FROM The interim president

Greetings from the Marygrove Campus:

Fall is always an exciting time of year for me—but this fall is particularly exciting thanks, in large part, to the warm welcome and encouragement I have received from all of you since becoming Interim President in July. Although I've had the pleasure of meeting many of you, I look forward to getting to know many more of you in the months ahead. I am confident that, together, we will not only continue, but also build upon the fine work of my predecessor, Dr. David J. Fike.

Although many of you already know my story, I would like to take this as an opportunity to give an abbreviated version of it to those of you who may not be familiar with my background.

While it is true that I am new to Detroit, I am not new to the academic presidency, or to Catholic higher education. Most recently, I served as President of Franklin Pierce University in New Hampshire. Prior to that, I was the Executive Vice President and Interim President at Wheeling Jesuit University in West Virginia. I have also worked at Regis University in Denver, Colorado and I earned my Ph.D. at Gonzaga University in Spokane,

Washington. Regis and Gonzaga are both Jesuit institutions, so it is with great excitement that I return to Catholic higher education—and more specifically to Marygrove, an institution with a rich history of service and an unwavering commitment to the values of its founders, the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHM).

Although my journey here at Marygrove has only just begun, the energy of my new colleagues, and their commitment to the college's mission, was something that I noticed immediately. Considering that, it seems fitting that this issue of Tower Times highlights not only the mission of the college, but the ways in which all of you live that mission and carry it beyond the campus gates and into the world. From the simple, humble act of returning a treasured piece of jewelry to a classmate, to the extraordinary lives of our alumni, and the heroic efforts of a current student who saved the life of a drowning child...all of these stories reveal to me, and I hope to you, the power of the Marygrove mission and the beauty of the IHM tradition. This is, indeed, a special place.

## THE INSTITUTE OF MUSIC & DANCE AT MARYGROVE COLLEGE FACILITATES INTERGENERATIONAL ART OUTREACH

As part of the Onstage! Program funded by The Kresge Foundation, the Institute of Music & Dance at Marygrove College recently developed an intergenerational, two-day art workshop that culminated in the creation of a mosaic that now hangs proudly in the McGivney-Bethune Senior Apartment Complex, located adjacent to Marygrove's campus.

Joined by Baltimore-based artists Susan Stockman and Bobby Malzone, 78 participants—including senior residents from the McGivney-Bethune Apartments and students from Renaissance High School, Hamtramck High School, and Marygrove College—collaborated to design a three-foot mosaic.

Using the ideas generated during their group discussion and brainstorming session, participants settled on the image of a tree whose roots bear down through earth and stone to produce not only beauty, oxygen, and a multitude of shapes and colors, but also protection for people and animals. The image of a mirrored heart at the center of the tree trunk and the background clouds were included to honor those who came before and left their mark on us.

This project was of special importance to both artist Bobby Malzone and organizer Judith Molina. Mr. Malzone's aunt, Sr. Francine Malzone, was an IHM sister and lived in the Motherhouse in Monroe. Ms. Molina opened the McGivney Bethune Apartments in 1995 and served as its manager for three years. She says it was especially gratifying for her to give back to the community that shares a piece of her heart.

## A HERO AMONG US














"Hero," is perhaps one of the most misused words

in the English language. We see it so often that

one might be tempted to conclude from reading

On the afternoon of July 13, Amber, who is a threeyear veteran lifeguard and a junior nursing major at Marygrove, had just finished an individual swimming lesson at the Hidden Creek Community Pool. As usual, she and fellow lifeguard Ellen Czajka packed up and were exiting the gates when they heard a jarring scream.

When Amber and Ellen arrived at the pool, they learned that a four-year-old boy had been standing at the edge of the pool watching his brother swim when he suddenly removed his puddle jumper, took a deep breath, and dove into the water—but after two and a half minutes beneath the surface, he still hadn't come up for air.

The lifeguards scanned the pool, but it was the boy's aunt who spotted him, dove in, pulled him up to the surface, and brought him to the side of the pool. Amber recalls "checking for a pulse; there wasn't one, so Ellen began compressions while I did rescue breathing."

When Amber looks back on the incident, she remembers a moment of terror where she just froze. "We panicked for a second when we were looking for him, but we quickly zoned in, blocked everyone else out, and did what we were trained to do."

After four rounds of cardiopulmonary resuscitation, the boy "took a gasp of air and began to breathe again on his own," Amber notes. It was about this time that Livingston County EMS and Howell firefighters and deputies arrived.

Thanks to Amber and Ellen, the following day the boy was awake, well, and playing games in the hospital room with his family at the University of Michigan Mott Children's Hospital.

So how does Amber feel about saving his life? In a word, grateful. "We were able to give him another chance at his life. Instead of the family suffering a loss, they can rejoice that he is still here, that he can grow up, and contribute to society."

And how does Amber feel about being called a hero? Like most heroes, she remains self-effacing: "I like to think of it as just doing my job—just doing what I was trained to do."

#### MARYGROVE COLLEGE RECEIVES GRANT TO HELP FAST-TRACK CAREERS IN BIOMEDICAL SCIENCE



NIH / Research Enhancement Building Infrastructure Leading to Diversity

**REBUILD**etroit

Marygrove College, along with University of Detroit Mercy, Wayne State University, and Wayne County Community College, is the proud recipient of a grant of \$21.2 million from The National Institutes of Health. This grant will fund the implementation of ReBUILD Detroit, an initiative that will support the revitalization of the city by establishing Detroit as the center for biomedical research training for underrepresented undergraduate students.

The objective is twofold: First, to have at least 75 percent of ReBUILD Scholars graduate with baccalaureate degrees in biomedical science, or related fields, after completing four years of full-time study; second, for 50 percent of those graduates to matriculate into biomedical research doctoral programs.

During the first week of July, Marygrove launched the ReBUILD Summer Experience Program and welcomed its first class of eight ReBUILD Scholars. These students will spend four weeks at the college getting a head start on their college experience and completing projects with other ReBUILD scholars from the other schools in the consortium.

During the summer, faculty members have been retooling curriculum to focus on the three main research topics involved with the grant. These projects include urban garden soil testing, the DNA bar code of life, and health disparities, giving students hands-on experience in the kinds of projects that are relevant to overcoming the challenges experienced by many residents in the city of Detroit.

## LOST RING -FOUND FRIENDS



On a cold, snowy day in Ann Arbor roughly 35 years ago, Marygrove alumna Judith J. Krause Castillo ('66) lost her class ring that she loved the dearly. She retraced her steps to locate it, but the fresh snow and bustle of the street had taken the ring away.

Fast forward to July 2015. Andrea Butts Turkovics, the younger sister of Marygrove alumna Bethany Goodall Wiser ('66), was browsing the stalls at an antique fair in Petoskey, Michigan. On one of the vendor's tables, she noticed a class ring that looked suspiciously like the one her big sister Beth had loved and worn so often and for so many years that the band finally gave out. Upon closer inspection, Andrea confirmed not only that the ring was indeed from Marygrove College, but that it was marked '66—the same year her older sister graduated—and engraved with the initials "JJK."

Immediately, Andrea knew she had to purchase the ring, find "JJK", and return the lost item to her. The vendor was asking \$130 for the ring—a bit pricey, but Andrea was determined. To offset the cost, she turned over a dozen pieces of her own Arizona silver, laid \$30 on the table, and walked away with the Marygrove class ring and a new mission.

After purchasing the ring, Andrea phoned her sister who, with the help of Marygrove's Alumni Office, scoured the Class of '66 roster and identified three possible matches with "JK" initials. Beth made the first call and explained the story of the lost ring. No match. That left two other possible owners—unfortunately, the most likely candidate didn't have a current phone number or email address on file.

Resorting to "snail mail," Jan Machusak drafted a letter to Judith J. Krause Castillo, '66 and found the match. It was her ring, lost 35 years ago on that bitterly cold and snowy day in Ann Arbor. After receiving the letter, she contacted Jan then Beth and Andrea. In her conversations, Judith recounted in detail the day and exact spot she had lost the ring.

Judith had been at the corner of State and Huron in Ann Arbor when she removed her Isotoner gloves and crossed the street. But when she arrived home, she realized that she had left her ring behind. Defying the weather, Judith and her husband went back into Ann Arbor, combed the crosswalk, but eventually gave up the search.

When Judith tried to repay Andrea for the cost of the ring, Andrea refused and simply requested that, when Judith had the opportunity, she pay it forward. The widespread and long-lasting spirit of Marygrove, and commitment to this community, reunited a Marygrove alumna with her class ring and a former classmate.

This is the kind of act—Beth and Andrea, you are the kind of people—that make us proud to be a part of the Marygrove College community.






