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A Message From Marygrove President David J. Fike

I am very pleased to announce to you that Dr. Juliana Mosley will be Marygrove College's next Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management, effective January 1, 2011.

Dr. Mosley joins our community after serving for more than five years

as the Vice President for Student Affairs at Philander Smith College (PSC) in Little Rock, Arkansas and I am confident that she brings the talent, experience, and passionate commitment to students that will serve Marygrove and its mission well. At PSC, she gained valuable experience overseeing departments and activities critical to student success, including: Residential Life, Counseling and Disability Services, Career Services, Student Involvement and Leadership, Religious Life, Student Government Association, Judicial Affairs, Health Services, and Campus Security. She developed innovative programs to address student needs, including a "Pathfinders Mentoring Program" for first-year students, a "Platinum by Design" program for female students, and an intensive Freshman Academic Advising program. In addition, it is noteworthy that Dr. Mosley served as primary writer and editor of PSC's self study for its comprehensive accreditation review in 2007, supervised the efforts by PSC to join the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) in 2008, and collaborated with PSC's Fiscal Affairs division to renovate an existing campus building to serve as an honors residential hall (opened in 2009) and the construction of an apartment/suite residential facility (opened this fall). Prior to her tenure at PSC, Dr. Mosley gained experience working in the Office of the President at Kentucky State University and in Multicultural Affairs at John Carroll University in Cleveland.

Dr. Mosley has earned a Ph.D. in Education Leadership with a concentration in Administration as well as an M.A. in Curriculum and Teacher Leadership with a concentration in Urban Education, both from Miami University of Ohio. Her B.S. in Business Education is from Ball State University. Her research interests include Black women's leadership, racial identity attitudes of Black students, culturally relevant curricula and communities, mental health issues among Black college students and first generation college students. She has been an invited presenter on

these topics at the University of Cincinnati, the University of Central Arkansas, the University of Arkansas, and Miami University of Ohio, as well as making numerous presentations to the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA). She has served as

a Board Member for the IV-West Region of NASPA (2006-2008) as well as a Member of NASPA's National Advisory Board for Historical Black Colleges and Universities (2006-2010) and, in 2003, was the only non-faculty recipient out of 100 educators in higher education to receive an "Excellence in Education Award" from Ohio Magazine. Please join me in welcoming Dr. Juliana Mosley to the Marygrove College community.

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Brenda Price named Marygrove's First Urban Leadership Fellow



Marygrove College has named Ms. Brenda Price, program director for the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation in Detroit and, until recently, also in Gary, Indiana, to be its first Urban Leadership Fellow. The Urban Leadership Fellow will be an active

learning member and catalyst for innovation with the faculty and staff involved in designing and leading the College's Urban Leadership Initiatives. She began her work at Marygrove on November 1. As this is an area of interest for Knight, the foundation has committed to make a planning grant to Marygrove to support this work.

Ms. Price has over 20 years of experience in community and government affairs, public policy, business, and philanthropy. She is familiar with the College's urban leadership work, having supported the initial planning work of Marygrove's Neighborhood Empowerment and Enhancement Initiative as well as having co-convended with Marygrove's President in a conversation among philanthropic leaders about the College's strategic vision in January 2008. During her six-year tenure at the Knight Foundation, she led and collaborated on many important projects, including Detroit's Northend Neighborhood, Knight's broadband and library initiatives, the New Economy Initiative and the Funders Collaborative for Workforce Solutions. Prior to that, Ms. Price was a program consultant and Senior Program Officer for the Community Foundation for

Southeastern Michigan, among the top 30 largest community foundations in the country, where she managed several strategic investment programs including oversight for grants involving faith-based, youth, education, and community and economic development programs.

As Marygrove's Urban Leadership Fellow, Ms. Price will help enhance the knowledge of faculty and staff about best practices, research studies, examples of other programs and community initiatives nationally and locally, philanthropic interests, and leading practitioners in the fields of leadership and urban community development. In addition, her role will be to identify opportunities to integrate the emergent urban leadership programs and activities in ways that promote broader and deeper campus-wide learning. In short, the Urban Leadership Fellow will help connect human talent and resources—both externally and internally—in order to accelerate institutional transformation toward achieving the College's strategic vision.

Establishing the position of Urban Leadership Fellow marks an important milestone in the College's larger Urban Leadership vision and strategy. The College has great confidence that Brenda Price's talent and experience adds significant strength to the team of faculty and staff who are working to create a national model of a college engaged in transforming the social reality of its community and we hope you will join us in welcoming Brenda to Marygrove.

Marygrove Launches New Associate Degree in Health Science

Marygrove is pleased to announce a new Associate of Science in Health Science degree (ASHS).

The College has revised the archived Associate of Science in Allied Health Degree to accommodate curricular needs for students wishing to pursue careers in Health Science through a career ladder approach which includes certificates, associates degrees, bachelor's degrees and beyond.

"This program is in keeping with Marygrove's commitment to serve as an urban leader in Metro Detroit by helping to address the need for well trained health care professionals who will stay in the community and serve the growing health care needs of the area," said Jo Ann Cusmano, Marygrove's Vice President for Strategic Initiatives.

The program is primarily aimed at licensed health care professionals who hold professional certifications and wish

to pursue a degree. Marygrove College will award 24 undergraduate credit hours toward the ASHS to students who have



successfully completed LPN or Pharmacy Technician training, and have passed the Practical Nurse License Examination (PNLEX) exam, or the National Pharmacy Technician Certification (NPTC) exam.

There are many benefits to the program, including increased earning potential and career advancement. Since this is part of a Marygrove "career ladder" program, students will be able to apply all of their

ASHS coursework to Marygrove's Bachelor of Science in Health Science degree which can result in priority admission to the Oakland University Accelerated BSN program or prepare students for advanced professional medical education.

Cusmano added, "We will be training future practitioners and leaders who will influence policy and practice related to health care delivery in the Metro Detroit area. This program also supports the strategic growth plan for science and mathematics, and builds upon the excellent faculty and resources we have in that area."

2011 Contemporary American Authors Lecture Series

Guest Harryette Mullen

Marygrove's English and Modern Languages Department is pleased to announce that the award-winning poet and literary scholar, **Harryette Mullen will be the 23rd guest in its Contemporary American Authors Lecture Series. Professor Mullen will deliver the Lillian and Don Bauder Lecture in Alumnae Hall at 8 p.m. on Friday, April 15, 2011.** Earlier in the day, she will conduct a class session for students from local high schools and Marygrove.

The author of five books of poetry, Mullen has taught at Cornell University and now teaches creative writing and African-American literature at the University of California, Los Angeles. She has received the Gertrude Stein Award in Innovative American Poetry, a PEN Beyond Margins Award, and the 2010 Jackson Poetry Prize. She also has been a finalist for the National Book Award and the National Book Critics Circle Award.

Mullen was born in Alabama and raised in Texas. She received her bachelor's degree

from the University of Texas, Austin and her master's degree and Ph.D. from the University of California, Santa Cruz.



Her poems challenge us to rethink our ideas about gender, race, language, politics, and popular culture by engaging in wordplay—puns, jokes, acrostics, and anagrams. Elisabeth A. Frost has written, "Crossing the lines between often isolated aesthetic camps, Harryette Mullen has pioneered her own form of bluesy, disjunctive lyric poetry, combining a concern for the political issues raised by identity politics with a poststructuralist

emphasis on language." As Carol Muske-Dukes says, Mullen's poetry is "a little like the Muse playing scrabble."

The Contemporary American Authors Lecture Series (CAALS) began in 1989. Since then, the series has welcomed to Marygrove three National Book Award recipients, three American Book Award recipients, two Pulitzer Prize winners, seven MacArthur Award grantees, the 1993-5 Poet Laureate of the United States, and the 2008 Presidential Inaugural Poet.

For many years, Marygrove students have competed for the Amy S. McCombs and Frederick P. Currier Writing Awards presented as part of this series. This year, through the increased generosity of long-time series supporters Lillian and Don Bauder, the College has established the Mary Helen Washington Writing Awards—a contest for high school students named after the great scholar and CAALS consultant. The recipients of these awards will be recognized prior to the Bauder Lecture on April 15.

English Masters Program to Begin Recruitment Drive



In the coming months, the Department of English and Modern Languages will launch a major effort to increase enrollment in its Master of Arts in English.

A revitalized Web presence, updated recruitment materials, and a direct mail campaign are a few of the activities planned to bring new students into the program.

"We're enormously proud of the personalized, rigorous degree we've developed, and we're hoping to make many new groups aware of all we offer," said Dr. Donald Levin, professor of

English and chair of the department. "We're also going to ask graduates and current students to help us spread the word about the many benefits of joining us."

Designed for busy, working students, the Master of Arts in English curriculum is a 33-credit hour degree that can be completed in two years or less. Classes are offered at night at Marygrove.

All courses and related activities emphasize the rich and rewarding joys of studying literature and writing in small classes that focus on students' needs. The program's flexibility allows students to create a personal plan of work in consultation with the distinguished faculty of the department.

"If you've been thinking about getting a master's degree to further your education to teach literature and composition in high school or community college, to get ready for doctoral studies, or simply to pursue a love of literature and learning, this is the program for you," said Dr. Levin.

Our faculty are superb teachers and respected scholars in fields ranging from the Middle Ages through the most contemporary post-colonial literature, experimental women's writing, and composition theory and practice. We work closely with our students to prepare them to present at conferences, publish their work, and take part in a range of activities in the department, across the College, and throughout the profession."

New students can begin their personalized program in any semester. The process starts with the graduate application, available from the Office of Graduate Studies on campus or online at www.marygrove.edu, then click on Future Students, then admissions.

MARGARET R. BRENNAN, IHM '45

In 2009, Margaret R. Brennan, IHM, Ph.D., published her memoir, "What Was There for Me Once." In it she reflects on the many changes that occurred in religious life in the United States from 1945, when she became a nun, through the "epoch-making experience of the Second Vatican Council." She also wrote about

the changes in her own life as an IHM during that time.

Sister Margaret (Benedicta) took on a direct role in "Sister Formation" when she was named IHM Novice Directress in 1962. Four years later, Sister Margaret was elected General Superior of the IHMs, a post she held for the next decade and a period of great change. She oversaw a congregation as far flung as a multi-national corporation with IHM sisters in Vietnam, Brazil, Uganda, Kenya, Ghana, Zimbabwe and South Africa.

So that women's voices, scholarship and experience could be heard in a male-dominated church, Sister Margaret determined that the order should have more theologians among its members. Ten sisters were selected to earn doctorates in theology and canon law. They studied at Louvain, Rome, Paris, Toronto, Notre Dame and elsewhere. She also served as President of the Leadership Council of Women Religious from 1972-73.

After Sister Margaret completed her term as General Superior, she accepted an offer to join a pilot program at Regis College, part of the Toronto School of Theology. She remained there until retirement 25 years later.



MARGARET ANN PETRIE '60

"Riveting," "Exhilarating," "Inspiring as it is fascinating," were just a handful of reviewers' kudos for "Mother Teresa," a film produced by Margaret Ann Petrie '60 and Jeanette Petrie and shown at the 40th Anniversary of the United Nations in 1985 before Mother Teresa addressed the assembly.

Ann fell in love with television production while at Marygrove when a University of Detroit crew broadcasted a Drama Society play. At ABC-TV New York, Ann produced public affairs programs and earned an Emmy. Ann was committed to making good news interesting.

This led Ann to Mother Teresa. Ann thought news coverage of Mother Teresa after she received the Nobel Peace Prize, missed her mysterious presence so Ann took a production crew to Calcutta and wrote, produced and directed "The World of Mother Teresa," a documentary for PBS.

Ann and her sister sought to make a longer film to show the universality of Mother Teresa's work with the poorest of the poor. "Mother Teresa" was their effort to illuminate the human transformations they had seen firsthand in themselves and others. They shot film on-the-run for over five years, following Mother Teresa through ten countries and over four continents. The result is an intimate look at the unique hands-on care by Mother Teresa.

In 1997, they filmed the private burial of Mother Teresa. The resulting documentary interspersed with Mother Teresa's own voice premiered at the Vatican at her beatification in 2003.

From 1969 to 1976 Ann was Writer-in-Residence and teacher at the City College of New York. She also worked on movies such as "Moonstruck" and on several television series.



SUZANNE STEAD HUSBAND '65

In 1977, two years after enrolling the youngest of her three children in Montessori Children's House (MCH), Suzanne Stead Husband accepted the position of director of the small Montessori preschool. As the school's children grew older, Sue and the parents decided to expand beyond educating very young children. MCH purchased its own building and grew to include a student population of 200 from preschool through sixth grade.

Mary Jo White '69 wrote that Sue has always been a hands-on administrator and committed to promoting racial and ethnic diversity and understanding. White remembers her own son, then about four years old, talking in the car as they passed the school. "That's my school and I feel as if it's smiling at me."

Sue expanded the educational program to include experiential learning by participating in Meals on Wheels and Habitat for Humanity. The school had a regular 'Meals' route every other week. On delivery day two children would accompany a staff person to the homes of about 10 housebound people. The students who participated in 'Habitat' visited the sites and with the guidance of one of the carpenters, learned basic woodworking and were able to apply their new skills into actual on-the-job carpentry.

Sue retired in 2008. She still spends about one day a week working with individual or small groups of students on such issues as conflict resolution and emphasizing the concepts of "freedom and responsibility."



MARK HONEYMAN '85

Mark Honeyman '85 challenges his West Hills Middle School students to, "Be crazy enough to believe you can change the world and then go ahead and do it."

He credits Marygrove for helping him incorporate that belief into his own life. Mark dropped out after a year at Michigan State University, lost in a sea of 45,000 students. Marygrove was the one college that was willing to take a chance on him. "With my first education class, adolescent psychology, I knew I had found my mission."

Mark teaches English to every eighth grade student in his Bloomfield Hills school, about 130 each year. His students have won writing awards in local, state, national and international contests, earning more than \$35,000 in prizes since 2002. They collected 7,000 books to distribute to the needy and contributed \$3,000 for medical relief in Ethiopia. Students, moved by the extent of modern-day human slavery in the world, raised more than \$13,000 for Free the Slaves. After 10 years teaching at Andover High School, Mark moved to West Hills Middle School. Outside the classroom, Mark and his wife Mary, who also teaches at West Hills, formed a club—Count Me In—to reduce bullying and increase understanding among students.

Mark spends about two hours each night answering email queries and concerns from students. In 2004 Mark was named Oakland County Middle School Teacher of the Year.

Alumni Award Recipients

While at Andover High School, Mark directed nine musicals and plays and was the forensics coach. He has conducted and sung in several church choirs. He also taught choral music for several years at West Hills.



PATRICIA SIROKY KONOVALOV '87

Patricia Siroky Konovalov '87 taught three years at Detroit's East Catholic High School, developed a school choir and organized community service projects.

In 1990 Trisha decided to explore her heritage in Czechoslovakia which led to a position teaching English as a foreign language to university students in Presov where she met her husband Yuri. Trisha taught intensive classes in English for another year at a business school. She completed her Master of Arts in Human Development and Family Studies at Central Michigan University in 2000 while simultaneously teaching at Mid-Michigan Community College. The following year Trisha was among a group of community college professors selected for a Fulbright Program in Slovakia and the Czech Republic.

Trisha has worked in several grant-funded initiatives. One involved running a literacy program at the TVR Correctional Facility in Baldwin, where years later she is remembered for working her "magic" in acquiring books and materials and conducting a high impact program. She was named Employee of the Year in 2003 by the Mason County School District. Trisha also has helped adults in the Idlewild community in rural Lake County improve job skills, family life skills and obtain GED certification.

Trisha has been an instructor in Marygrove's summer distance learning program for teachers. She recruited students and arranged venues for intensive one-week classes which lead to a Master in the Art of Teaching degree.

Recently Trish has ventured outside the education field. She managed the social service department for a large nursing home in Big Rapids. Later she became Executive Director of the Women's Information Service, Inc., a domestic violence shelter and service center. Currently Trisha is pursuing a doctorate at Ferris State University focused on community college leadership.



KIM REDIGAN '08

Kim Redigan was a peace and social justice advocate years before she enrolled in Marygrove's Master in Social Justice program. Fellow graduate and Fox News reporter Amy Lange wrote of Kim: "I have to ask myself where this dedicated mother/teacher/activist/volunteer found the time to go back to school and get yet another degree— but she did—graduating in

2008 from Marygrove. Kim already had degrees from the University of Detroit Mercy and from the University of Michigan-Dearborn. Always the scholar, always the activist—she chose Marygrove's Social Justice program to improve her understanding of the many issues surrounding us in this ailing city and this challenging world..."

For her Social Justice degree project, Kim collaborated with Liz Walters, IHM to form the Isaiah 2 Movement: "To build a local, faith-based peace and disarmament movement, grounded in Biblical and Catholic social

teachings, committed to contemplation and action." The title comes from Isaiah, Chapter 2, a reference to "turning swords into plowshares." For five years, Kim has taught courses in world religions at the University of Detroit Jesuit High School, exposing students to the beliefs of others as well as to Catholic theology. School vacation periods often take Kim to world hot spots. Kim has served on two peace teams to the West Bank with the Michigan Peace Team and the Gaza Freedom March. Achieving a just peace in the Middle East is Kim's greatest passion. She is often queried by the *Detroit News* and *Detroit Free Press* as well as the *Arab American News* on peace and non-violent protest issues. Angela volunteered as a life coach at Matrix Human Services, assisting with parenting classes and substance abuse groups as well as speaking to community organizations on Matrix. She was given the Matrix Awards in 2008 and 2009. She works with the Moratorium Now! Campaign against foreclosures and evictions and has participated in rallies in Detroit and Lansing, encouraged by Professor Diane McMillan to get involved in political issues. Angela has volunteered at the Capuchin Soup Kitchen, Interim House Domestic Violence Shelter and Vista Maria.

The Joy Luck Club By Amy Tan

Amy Tan's best-selling first novel, *The Joy Luck Club*, explores the clash between Chinese and American culture, chronicled through the lives of four Chinese women drawn together by the shadow of their past. Then they begin meeting in San Francisco in 1949 to play Mah Jong, invest in stocks and "say" stories. They call their gathering the Joy Luck Club and forge a relationship that binds them for more than three decades.

This mother-daughter story achieves more than just a glimpse into Chinese culture and heritage. It is an outline of a number of challenges for women, including social rules, expectations, marriage, food dishes, clothing choices, and raising children. By the novel's end, Tan has opened the door for a number of potential discussions on identity, the connection of the past and the present, communication between American daughters and Chinese mothers, the power of language, love, loss, and redemption.

On **Friday, Feb. 18 from 6:00 -7:30 p.m.**, the 1993 film version of *The Joy Luck Club* will be shown, starring Tamlyn Tomita as Waverly Jong; Rosalind Chao as Rose Hsu Jordan; Kieu Chinh as Suyuan Woo; Tsai Chin as Lindo Jong; Ming-Na as Jing-mei 'June' Woo; and France Nuyen as Ying-ying St. Claire. 

These awards honor graduates who have made significant contributions and demonstrated leadership in any of the


following areas:
