The College Community celebrated its One Hundred Fifth Commencement on May 10, and the pride of our graduates could be felt far beyond the campus gates that day. It is easily one of my most favorite days of the year, to see the culmination of years of hard work for our students, faculty and staff.

One of the more exciting changes on campus this spring has been the addition of a key member of the College's senior leadership team. Jackie is a pioneer in her field, and was the first woman to serve as commissioner representing four-year colleges and universities on the Michigan Truck Safety Commission; appointed four times by Governor Jennifer Granholm (D). Her warmth and genuine rapport with faculty and students alike is infectious — she is an optimistic person who loves a challenge, and was immediately drawn to our IHM-founded mission and urban leadership vision.

One of the first items on the agenda to be set in motion was Jackie's assistance in rounding out Marygrove's Science, Technology, (pre-)Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) offering — by formalizing the foundational engineering classes through the College of Engineering at the University of Detroit Mercy (UDM). The Detroit-Area Catholic Higher Education Consortium provides Marygrove students the opportunity to study at UDM at Marygrove College tuition rates, which is a tremendous advantage. We thank her for collaborating with Assistant to the President for New Program Development and Associate Professor of Chemistry, Dr. Sally Welch, to bring this to fruition. Building on the strength of our partnerships for the benefit of our students is something you will be hearing more about in the future.

In the meantime, please keep in touch, stay involved, and hold your alma mater close in thought and deed! There is so much positive energy here, and like all of you, I feel very privileged to be a part of it.

ARTIST DONNA DIAMOND RETURNS TO DETROIT FOR CREATIVITY WORKSHOPS

Through the Marygrove College Institute of Music and Dance, Marygrove art therapy students participated in creative workshops offered by award-winning artist Donna Diamond during her visit to Detroit March 11-14. Arranged by Marygrove staff, participants totaled 154 students and six teachers from across Detroit.

While here, Ms. Diamond, who is the illustrator of the Newberry Award Winning book “Bridge to Terabithia,” visited senior citizens at McGivney-Bethune apartments. Residents were treated to Ms. Diamond’s talent for coaxing creativity from all ages. “The workshop made my day a better day,” noted one pleased participant.

Ms. Diamond also mentored first- through third-grade students at the Nataki Talibah Schoolhouse and helped them explore color and the feelings inspired by the creation of their art. “It made me feel awesome making a new invention by myself,” observed one young student after the workshop. Two art classes at Martin Luther King High School were particularly inspired by Ms. Diamond’s workshop: “I got to tell my story, my wonderful story without saying ANYTHING.”

Helping students find the ability, freedom and creativity to express themselves without barriers and judgment, Ms. Diamond also hosted workshops geared towards those with special needs. “This made me feel like a real artist,” noted one Hamtramck high school student.

Each of Ms. Diamond’s workshops is designed to offer individuals the opportunity to explore and create art that is completely their own. Through art, participants become actively involved in the process of self-expression that is unmediated by words. Marygrove Art Therapy students and workshop participants can attest, “Ms. Diamond, through her lecture, showed me that art is not about what the picture looks like, but how I feel while making art.”

CAREER CORNER



Welcome to Career Corner, a new feature of *The Tower Times*. Here you'll discover how Marygrove's future graduates are being prepared to find and pursue fulfilling careers, along with occasional tips, techniques, and events that alumni may find helpful when considering a career transition.

On February 25, 2014, Madame Cadillac's main hallway was bustling with activity as representatives from Academic Advising, Alumni Relations, Career Services, Connecting to the Grove, and Urban Leadership gathered to support the 58 students attending Marygrove's first-ever Major Decisions: Choosing Your Professional Path event. Originally conceived to help undecided students and those re-thinking their choice of major, event organizers were surprised to discover that many juniors and seniors — confident in their choice of major — also used the event to explore their career options.

Depending on their needs and interests, students moved through up to five stations, each with defined learning outcomes:

STATION 1: *Assess skills and interests using an online Self-Directed Search assessment*

STATION 2: *Research majors that match interests, and investigate occupations that tie to majors*

STATION 3: *Use WebAdvisor to determine the impact of changing one's major or graduation date*

STATION 4: *Find out how to login to Career Link and prepare professionally while at Marygrove*

STATION 5: *Speak one-on-one with an advisor and receive referrals to Program Coordinators*

100 percent of those responding to a post-event survey noted they had a better understanding of their career options, that the Major Decisions event met or exceeded their expectations, and all recommended that we hold this event again. ***Based on their feedback, we plan to!***

MARYGROVE SENIOR SNARES JOB OF CHOICE AT LANSING CAREER FAIR

A blizzard didn't stop Marygrove Senior Muntadhar Alhussain or as his friends call him "Munt," from attending Lansing's Job Pursuit interview fair last month. Munt, a determined and focused student, planned ahead for the impending snow storm, bunking with a friend in Ann Arbor overnight to ensure his timely arrival at the annual event. Hosted by a consortium of private, independent colleges, Job Pursuit attracts many Michigan businesses looking for talented applicants like Munt.

With extensive preparation, and the support of the Marygrove Career Services Office, Munt was able to secure five interviews and four requests for employment at the event. Securing employment with his first choice, Konecranes, Munt gained entrance into a sought-after manager development program. During the program, Munt

will have the opportunity to learn all aspects of the business as well as travel domestically and internationally to broaden his knowledge of supply chain and project management.

After a follow-up interview, Munt also obtained sponsorship with AXA Advisers to obtain licensing in financial consultation for the state of Michigan. "As you can see, this job fair was a great deal of help to get my career going," Munt explains.

In addition to Konecranes, Munt received offers of employment from Comerica, AXA Advisers, and Coca-Cola. Marygrove Career Services Consultant Sherrie Konkus says Munt's "ability to leverage his degree into a supply chain management position is very interesting and instructive. He had that goal from my first interaction with him."

Munt's fortitude and drive combined with the support and preparation provided by Marygrove's Career Services was no match for the Michigan snow storm that blanketed the area with 6-8 inches of snow just prior to the event. Of his experience, Munt says, "It just goes to show that something worth having is worth some effort."

URBAN LEADERSHIP IN ACTION: THE CODY-ROUGE PARTNERSHIP

The Office of Urban Leadership (OUL) is challenging Marygrove College students to have a positive impact on the lives of young people in Detroit. We are currently partnering with several non-profit organizations, as well as an elementary school in the Cody-Rouge neighborhood, to mentor youth in after-school programs and develop work study opportunities for Marygrove students. The OUL, in conjunction with the Federal College Work Study Program within the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid, has placed Work Study students in several Cody-Rouge youth development organizations, including Developing Kids, Don Bosco Hall, and Detroit Public Schools' Dixon Elementary Academy.


This type of civic engagement continues the College's commitment to developing our students as urban leaders while having a positive impact on the city of Detroit. We train and certify all of our Marygrove student mentors as College Positive Volunteers, who promote the importance of college readiness to K-12 students. These exciting and engaging opportunities have allowed our student mentors to be responsible for leadership tasks such as serving as role models within our communities and assisting in classrooms with tutoring, skills-building, and developing positive relationships with young people.

The OUL recently partnered with Professors Mary Lou Greene and Penny Godboldo to design an initiative that brought students enrolled in Marygrove's AIE 344, Arts in Elementary Education course, to the classroom of third- and fourth-grade students at Dixon Elementary Educational Academy in Cody-Rouge. Professors Green and Godboldo along with Marygrove students from the AIE 344 course utilized a curriculum of arts and movement to mentor students in the Sciences.

MEET STEVE BLOOMFIELD: MARYGROVE'S NEW ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Meet Steve Bloomfield, Marygrove's second athletic director after longtime AD Dave Sichterman stepped down to take the same post at Olivet College. Bloomfield, brought on board a week prior to the start of the 2013-14 academic year, was appointed by President Fike. Since arriving on campus, Bloomfield has continued the growth of an athletics program that recently completed their second year in the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference (WHAC). Most recently, the new AD announced the addition of baseball to Marygrove's ever-growing athletic slate. Baseball will begin play during the 2014-15 academic year.

Bloomfield comes to Marygrove with a wealth of experience in higher education after spending the past 14 years at Jackson Community College. During his time at Jackson, Bloomfield engineered several major projects as lead administrator for a variety of departments. In his most recent role, Bloomfield led the expansion of the athletics and housing programs as Assistant Dean and Athletic Director for the past seven years.

While serving as Assistant Dean and Athletic Director, Bloomfield was responsible for the development and implementation of a new campus housing program and the reintroduction of intercollegiate athletics after a 26-year hiatus. In 2006, the community college director brought on six intercollegiate varsity sports. By 2008, the sport offerings nearly doubled as Bloomfield showcased his vision for athletics expansion by adding five new programs to the growing athletic slate. The 11-sport department ranked second in total sports offerings in the 19-member Michigan Community College Athletic Association (MCCAA).

"It is my sincere pleasure to be a new member of Marygrove College and our Mustang athletic department," said Bloomfield. "This year was a blur, yet highly successful thanks to the support of the great team we have in place within our department. There certainly is a positive buzz surrounding the athletic department because of the great support from the College's leadership," Bloomfield continued. "We hope to continue to move forward with our vision of developing student-athletes to become Champions of Character, as well as champions in the classroom and in their sport. If we are successful in doing so, the student-athletes will most certainly add to Marygrove's long line of lifelong learners in the Metro Detroit community and across the globe."

A former student-athlete, Bloomfield played two years of college football at Ohio Wesleyan University before completing his undergraduate work and receiving a bachelor's degree from Albion College. He received a master's degree in counseling and human relations from Northern Arizona University.

Bloomfield lives near Jackson and has two children, Daria, 15, and James, 11.





MARYGROVE STUDENT-ATHLETES CONTINUE TO EXCEL ACROSS THE BOARD

ALL-AMERICANS AND WHAC ALL-CONFERENCE PERFORMERS

As of March 24, 2014, eight student-athletes received the national distinction of becoming United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) All-Americans. The achievements come after seasons in which the eight student-athletes propelled themselves into the ranks of the nation's elite student-athletes at the small college level.

The success continued at the conference level as several Mustangs made their mark in the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference (WHAC). In total, five student-athletes were named to the WHAC All-Conference teams from their respective sports. The five student-athletes: Darryll Dixon (Flint, Mich./Hamady High School), Jad El-Zein (Tyre, Lebanon/Dearborn Fordson High School), Abdoulie Jallow (Bansang, The Gambia/Rust College), Kara Kempinski (Livonia, Mich./Schoolcraft College), and Amelia Velez (Imlay City, Mich./Prairie View A&M) all completed terrific seasons to earn the right to be on the heralded conference list.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS AND MORE

An impressive 14 student-athletes were celebrated as Academic All-Americans by the USCAA at the conclusion of their respective seasons this year, while 10 student-athletes capped off WHAC play by being named to the conference's All-Academic Team. The impressive academic honors were rounded out by eight more that were named National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Daktronics Scholar-Athletes.

To be named a USCAA Academic All-American, a student-athlete must maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 with sophomore or above academic standing. Qualifiers for the NAIA-Daktronics Scholar-Athlete award must maintain a mirrored 3.5 cumulative GPA but have junior or above academic standing. The WHAC Academic All-Conference awardees were those with junior or above academic standing and a minimum of a 3.25 cumulative GPA.






ST. CATHERINE MEDAL

The Distinguished Alumni Awards celebrate the ideals of **competence** (the ability to understand and participate effectively in the promise of our evolving world), **compassion** (the capacity to care about and respect the worth and dignity of people), and **commitment** (the will to act responsibly based upon one's beliefs and to contribute to the building of a more just and humane world), qualities that Marygrove has always tried to instill in its graduates.

These awards honor graduates who have made significant contributions and demonstrated leadership in any of the following areas:

- Professional, educational or artistic endeavors
- The community through government service and/or civic organizations (such as Lions Club, City Planning Commissions, government committees, etc.)
- Political action, social justice or volunteer activities in schools, hospitals, etc.
- Marygrove College

Based on the number of qualified applicants, up to six awards will be given annually. For one of these awards, special consideration will be given to alumni who graduated within the last 15 years. All nominations will remain on file and will be reconsidered for two consecutive years.

The Distinguished Alumni Awards will be presented on Friday, September 19, 2014, at a special recognition event during Alumni Reunion weekend.



