News from Alumni Association President Sherrie Konkus '06



With spring finally taking hold, our senior students are wrapping up their final coursework, getting caught up in the whirlwind of activity surrounding graduation, and pursuing entry into graduate school or the job market. I've been reflecting a great deal lately on what we as a college, and in particular what we as an alumni association, do to help students in terms of that last item: getting a job.

In a strong economy, graduating smart, talented students can be enough. As long as graduates are prepared to let their skills shine through during an interview (and Marygrove frequently offers sessions to help hone these skills), the market will take care of the rest.

During an economic downturn, however, students face increased competition for fewer jobs, and can have a great deal of difficulty even getting in the door for an interview. Today, in parallel with developing professional skills through their formal degree program, our students need to develop their job readiness skills, build a portfolio, and begin to establish a professional network. Networking can be particularly challenging for students that are the first in their family to earn a college degree, or those pursuing a completely different field of study from their relatives; they may lack established family networks to tap into, or resources at home that can advise them in their job search.

Marygrove alumni have a wealth of talent, connections, and experience that can help Marygrove students develop the skills and connections needed to land a job. I'd like our Alumni Association to focus on putting that expertise to work on behalf of our students to help them increase their readiness for the job market.

Alumni Director **Diane Puhl**, Vice President **Yesenia Lara**, and I have been meeting with our Career Services resource, **Melissa Sanders**, to understand how we can help. We're pursuing a broad range of initiatives that will increase the support we offer students as they pursue a career. These initiatives include launching a new software platform that will enable students and alumni to create and post resumes, and allow employers to view them; enhancing our Career Services web page; and improving the materials students can pick up and review at their convenience.

I invite your participation today and over the course of the next few years as we strengthen our support of students' readiness for the job market. Do you have specific advice for students in year 1, year 2, year 3, or year 4 of their academic program (e.g., a professional society they might join)? Do you know of internship or job opportunities in the community? Are you willing to serve as a mentor for students that share your major, serve on an Alumni committee that supports a particular department or help students create or tailor a resume and cover letter?

Peer Recovery Mentor Certificate Program (PRMCP)

In collaboration with the Social Work Department, the Division of Continuing Education and Career Enhancement is pleased to announce the Peer Recovery Mentor Certificate Program. This 48 contact-hour training program (48 CEUs calculated in accordance with MCBAP requirements for workshop and seminars) has been developed to provide the educational component that meets the **Michigan Certification Board of Addiction Professionals (MCBAP)** requirements and is designed to allow participants who successfully complete the program to share their recovery experiences with others as a means to further their recovery while helping others.

Marygrove College meets all the standards and criteria for an approved provider of training with MCBAP. Participants must have a high school diploma or GED and one-year of sobriety is suggested.

Course instructor, Michael Long, LLMSW, has an extensive peer recovery coach mentor background and serves as a board member of the Oakland County Substance Abuse Services (OSAS) Advisory Council.

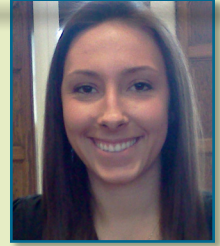

THE DISTINGUISHED STUDENT AWARD

Given to a graduating senior with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better, the Distinguished Student Award honors academic excellence, leadership ability and service to the community.

THE BRIGGS-FISHER FOUNDATION ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP FOR URBAN LEADERSHIP

Established by the Briggs-Fisher Foundation, this scholarship assists students from the metropolitan Detroit area who plan to remain in the area after graduation. These students are selected based on the promise that their future achievements and civic leadership contribute to effecting positive change in the city of Detroit. Award recipients must maintain a full-time course of study, have graduated from a metropolitan Detroit-area high school and have maintained a GPA of at least 3.0.

Keisha Price is a sophomore majoring in Religious Studies with a GPA of 3.639. She is the founder of the SASHA Center, a 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to the healing and assistance of survivors of sexual assault in the city of Detroit. Keisha will tell you that she feels it is her life's mission to serve and educate others, and as a long-time mentor she has helped many survivors learn effective strategies for positive communication and for forming positive relationships—the kinds of things that promote

greater healing in these very sensitive circumstances.

Stanley Howard is a senior majoring in language arts with a GPA of 3.078. He plans on making a career out of teaching. He is deeply involved in community projects, and for the past 15 years Stanley has been running a successful youth program that he founded with two friends in his Detroit neighborhood. The Motor City Heat basketball program began as a Detroit Police Athletic League and expanded to 30 teams in the Amateur Athletic Union, (AAU). Stanley's role today is focused on programming and mentoring, and he is currently developing a reading program out of Heilman Recreation Center on the city's east side.

THE ST. CATHERINE MEDAL

This medal is presented by Marygrove College through Kappa Gamma Pi, a national Catholic honor society, to further higher ideals in and greater appreciation for a Catholic college education. The award is presented annually to a sophomore or junior who has achieved a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better and who has performed outstanding service to the College.

Rebecca Collins is a junior with a double major studying both Biology and Environmental Studies. MUSTANGS HOST AWARDS RECEPTION

What an academic year 2012-13 has been for Mustang Athletics! This year played witness to our athletic teams participating in their inaugural season of Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference (WHAC) action. The fall and winter sports seasons brought plenty of memories for our student-athletes as they competed on-and-off the playing field to become the best they can be. Plenty of on-field moments were celebrated, but the most important achievements of all came via the classroom where many student-athletes were honored for their dedication to their academic pursuit.

The many accomplishments led to an evening entitled *The Mane Event: Mustang Athletic Awards*. **Dave Sichterman**, Marygrove's Director of Athletics & Wellness, made it a night to remember when he announced the end-of-the-year awards reception was to be held at MotorCity Casino's Amnesia Room in mid-April. The awards reception was a semi-formal affair similar to the ESPY Awards on ESPN in an environment that overlooked the city's evening skyline.

During the event, many Mustangs were awarded for their outstanding work in the classroom, in their sport, and in the community. Some of the awards doled out were: Mustang Award (Outstanding Academics, Athletics, and Service), Senior Award (Four Years of Athletic Excellence), Athlete of the Year (Most Outstanding Athlete of 2012-13), Academic Team of the Year, and the Green & Gold Award (Best Supporter of All Sports).

ALL-AMERICANS

As of April 1, 2013, five student-athletes received the national distinction of becoming United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) All-Americans. The achievements come after seasons in which the five student-athletes propelled themselves into the ranks of the nation's elite student-athletes at the small college level. Of the five, **Jessica**

Niemi (Swartz Creek, Mich./Swartz Creek) became Marygrove's first four-time First Team All-American in the 10-plus year history of Mustang Athletics. **Jordan Berry** (Dearborn, Mich./Crestwood) followed closely after becoming a four-time All-American with nominations from honorable mention to first team status throughout the course of his career.

The success continued at the conference level as several Mustangs made their mark in the WHAC. In total, four student-athletes were named to the WHAC All-Conference teams from their sport. The four student-athletes: **Jordan Berry**, **Abdoullie Jallow** (Bansang, The Gambia/Rust College), **Keara Marks** (Detroit, Mich./Renaissance), and **Jessica Niemi** all completed terrific seasons to earn the right to be on the heralded conference list.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS AND MORE

A staggering fifteen student-athletes were celebrated as Academic All-Americans by the USCAA at the conclusion of their respective seasons this year, while an equal fifteen student-athletes capped off their first season in the WHAC by being named to the conference's All-Academic Team. The impressive academic honors were rounded out by seven more that were named an NAIA Daktronics Scholar-Athlete.

To be named a USCAA Academic All-American, a student-athlete must maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 with sophomore or above academic standing. Qualifiers for the NAIA-Daktronics Scholar-Athlete award must maintain a mirrored 3.5 cumulative GPA but have junior or above academic standing. The WHAC Academic All-Conference awardees were those with junior or above academic standing and a minimum of a 3.25 cumulative GPA.

Internally, over 40 student-athletes were recognized at the end of the Fall 2012 semester by Marygrove's Director of Athletics & Wellness, Dave Sichterman, with the

release of the semi-annual Athletic Director Honor Roll. The 40-plus student-athletes named to the list achieved a semester GPA of 3.25 or higher while enrolling in and completing a minimum of 12 credit hours.

These awards honor graduates who have made significant contributions and demonstrated leadership in any of the

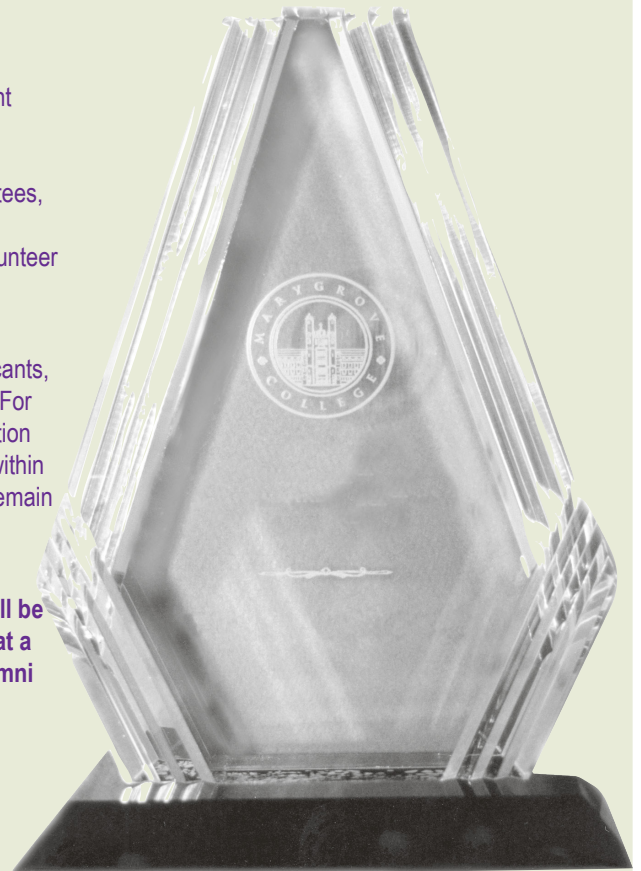
following areas:
